

SUMMARY

The Arizona Economic Planning and Development (EPAD) Board is an advisory board to the Governor on economic planning and development matters. The Board is provided staff support by and primarily communicates to the Governor through the Office of Economic Planning and Development (OEPAD).

According to state law passed in 1972, the Governor shall appoint an advisory board on economic planning and development consisting of at least 14 and no more than 20 members, with at least one member from each county. Beyond this, the law does not specify terms of membership, the intent, duties or powers of the EPAD Board. However, the Governor and the Executive Director of OEPAD have stated their objectives for the EPAD Board to include active citizen involvement on policy-making and utilization of the Board as a vehicle for county involvement in state government.

The forerunner of the EPAD Board was the Arizona Development Board which was created in 1954. The Arizona Development Board consisted of 14 members, one from each county, whose responsibilities included: 1) attracting tourists, new residents and new commercial industries to Arizona, and 2) exploring and publicizing Arizona's facilities, resources and potential in order to attract new capital and industry. The Arizona Development Board was replaced by the EPAD Board in 1968 while the Board's major duties were vested in the newly formed Department of Economic Planning and Development, later established as OEPAD.

The EPAD Board is entirely funded through the State General Fund appropriation for OEPAD administration.

Our review of the EPAD Board revealed the Board has had only superficial involvement in significant decisions and legislation involving economic planning and development. As of June 26, 1979, the EPAD Board has been non-operational for ten months and has met only twice in the past 18 months. Therefore, the Board's purpose, which is to actively involve citizens in policy-making and provide advice to the Governor, has not been fulfilled. (page 10)

Our review revealed there are at least 27 other boards, councils and commissions in Arizona that perform functions similar to those of the EPAD Board. (page 24)

In addition, our review disclosed that a majority of the EPAD Board appointees have not attended enough meetings to justify their membership. (page 28)

Our review also disclosed that since 1976 efforts to obtain public participation in the Economic Planning and Development Board meetings have declined to an inadequate level as have attempts to notify the public of Board meeting dates and actions. (page 34)

Finally, our review revealed that 39 individuals of various occupations have been appointed to serve as members of the EPAD Board since fiscal year 1973. (page 41)

It is recommended that:

- 1. The present role, involvement, lack of attendance, effectiveness and resulting low activity level of the Economic Planning and Development Board do not justify its continuance beyond July 1, 1980. If it is continued, a defined role for significant policy-making involvement, improved attendance and effectiveness should be obtained by gubernatorial and OEPAD Executive Director action. (page 23)
- 2. If continued beyond July 1, 1980, the EPAD Board should institute regular communication with at least the 27 other entities that perform similar functions and coordinate their efforts to avoid duplication. (page 27)
- 3. If continued beyond July 1, 1980, the Governor should appoint EPAD Board members with the interest and ability to attend meetings; Board meetings should be of such magnitude to justify member attendance and the Board should adopt by-laws governing attendance. (page 33)
- 4. If continued beyond July 1, 1980, the EPAD Board and OEPAD should adopt such methods for publicly announcing Board meetings and actions so citizens have the opportunity to express their concern on economic planning and development issues. (page 40)

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The Economic Planning and Development Board is an advisory board to the Governor on economic planning and development matters. The Board is provided staff support by and primarily communicates to the Governor through the Office of Economic Planning and Development (OEPAD).

The forerunner of the Economic Planning and Development Board was the Arizona Development Board which was created in 1954. The Arizona Development Board consisted of 14 members, one from each county, selected by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate to serve five-year terms. Its purpose included: 1) attracting tourists, new residents and new commercial industries to Arizona, and 2) exploring and publicizing Arizona's facilities, resources and potential in order to attract new capital and industry to the State. The Arizona Development Board's duties and authority included the employment of assistants, the issuance of reasonable contracts, utilization of communication media, adoption of rules and regulations deemed necessary and the acceptance of gifts to the state.

In 1968 the Arizona Development Board was replaced by the Economic Planning and Development Board while the major duties of the former Board were vested in the newly formed Department of Economic Planning and Development. As a result, the duties and authority of the EPAD Board were reduced to appointing the Department of Economic Planning and Development Director with the consent of the Governor and providing advice to the Director and the Governor. The membership of the EPAD Board was increased to 19 members. additional members were to represent the State as a whole as opposed to being county representatives. Legislation in 1972, ARS 41-502, established the present form of the EPAD Board. According to ARS 41-502*, the Governor shall appoint an advisory board on economic planning and development consisting of at least 14 and no more than 20members, with at least one member from each county. Beyond this, the law does not specify terms of membership, the intent, duties or powers of the EPAD Board. However, Governors of Arizona and the Executive Director of OEPAD have stated that their objectives for the EPAD Board include active citizen involvement in policy-making and utilization of the EPAD Board as a vehicle for county involvement in state government.

Appendix I contains a copy of this statute.

The EPAD Board is funded entirely through a general fund appropriation. The funds used to support the EPAD Board are contained within the OEPAD administration budget appropriation. EPAD Board expenditures for fiscal years 1975-76 through 1978-79 are shown below.

SUNSET FACTORS

In accordance with ARS 41-2351 through 41-2374, nine factors were considered to determine, in part, whether the Arizona Economic Planning and Development Board should be continued or terminated.

These factors are:

- 1. Objective and purpose in establishing the Board,
- 2. The degree to which the Board has been able to respond to the needs of the public and the efficiency with which it has operated,
- 3. The extent to which the Board has operated within the public interest,
- 4. The extent to which rules and regulations promulgated by the Board are consistent with the legislative mandate,
- 5. The extent to which the Board has encouraged input from the public before promulgating its rules and regulations and the extent to which it has informed the public as to its actions and their expected impact on the public,
- 6. The extent to which the Board has been able to investigate and resolve complaints that are within its jurisdiction,
- 7. The extent to which the attorney general or any other applicable agency of state government has the authority to prosecute actions under enabling legislation,
- 8. The extent to which the Board has addressed deficiencies in its enabling statutes which prevent it from fulfilling its statutory mandate, and
- 9. The extent to which changes are necessary in the laws of the Board to adequately comply with the factors listed in this subsection.

SUNSET FACTORS

SUNSET FACTOR: OBJECTIVE AND PURPOSE IN ESTABLISHING THE BOARD

According to ARS 41-502*, the purpose of the Economic Planning and Development Board is to provide advice to the Governor:

"The governor shall appoint an advisory economic planning and development board which shall be composed of at least fourteen and no more than twenty members who shall serve without compensation. At least one member shall be a bona fide resident of each county of this state." (Emphasis added)

In a 1977 article appearing in the July/August/September issue of <u>Directions</u>,***
the purpose of the Economic Planning and Development Board was described
as:

"...assist(ing) the Governor and Executive Director (of OEPAD) in shaping relevant policies for the state. The Board provides guidance on budgets, work programs and projects. The Executive Director welcomes the active involvement of the Advisory Board in the policy-making process....It is the philosophy of the Executive Director that effective and realistic policies in the area of economic planning and development demand meaningful citizen input, and the Advisory Board provides a statewide mechanism for this public contact." (Emphasis added)

The Governor of Arizona in a speech to the Board on August 15, 1975, explained his intent for its operation. The Board minutes stated:

"Board members, the Governor said, are to see to it every community has input into state government, as well as to the Governor. He said his door was wide open to them because they were the voices of their communities. He wanted their ideas and wanted them to join the team for economic development..." (Emphasis added)

Appendix I contains a copy of this statute.

Directions was a newsletter published by the Office of Economic Planning and Development until its discontinuance in June.

The Executive Director of OEPAD in a statement on October 31, 1978, explained the objectives of the Board to be:

"Objectives of the Board are to <u>advise the Governor</u> on matters of economic planning and development. The Board is a <u>county 'sounding board'</u> and <u>allows small</u> <u>county representation in state government." (Emphasis added)</u>

SUNSET FACTOR: THE DEGREE TO WHICH
THE BOARD HAS BEEN ABLE TO RESPOND
TO THE NEEDS OF THE PUBLIC AND THE
EFFICIENCY WITH WHICH IT HAS OPERATED

The Board has been limited in its efforts to respond to the needs of the public by its superficial involvement in significant policy-making decisions and legislation involving economic planning and development. (For a discussion of this issue, see page 10.)

In addition, the low attendance by a majority of Board members and the absence of any meetings in the ten months from August 20, 1978 to June 26, 1979, have also impaired the Board's ability to respond to the needs of the public. (For a discussion of these issues, see pages 20 and 28.)

However, the Board did, in September of 1977, notably respond to public need by organizing state efforts to address the problems created by the decline in the price of copper and resulting mine-related layoffs. Further, the Board has supported the creation of a naval stores plant near Winslow and assisted in negotiations regarding the plant with the Department of Agriculture.

The Board appears to be efficient in its operations since its expenditures are almost entirely for per diem and reimbursement of travel expenses of Board members and OEPAD staff attending Board meetings.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE BOARD HAS OPERATED WITHIN THE PUBLIC INTEREST

The Board appears to have taken no actions that were inconsistent with the public interest. However, the absence of activity on the Board's part, particularly since August 1978, makes it difficult to conclude that the Board is operating in the public interest.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO
WHICH RULES AND REGULATIONS
PROMULGATED BY THE BOARD ARE
CONSISTENT WITH LEGISLATIVE
MANDATE

The Economic Planning and Development Board has not promulgated any rules and regulations. Based upon a review of legislation (ARS 41-502), it appears the Board is not required to promulgate rules and regulations.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO
WHICH THE BOARD HAS ENCOURAGED
INPUT FROM THE PUBLIC BEFORE
PROMULGATING ITS RULES AND
REGULATIONS AND THE EXTENT
TO WHICH IT HAS INFORMED THE

THEIR EXPECTED IMPACT ON THE
PUBLIC

Efforts to encourage public participation and to inform the public of its actions and their expected impact have since 1976 been declining to an inadequate level. (For a discussion of this issue, see page 34)

The Board is not required to promulgate rules and regulations. Therefore, this aspect of the sunset factor is not applicable to the Board.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO WHICH
THE BOARD HAS BEEN ABLE TO INVESTIGATE
AND RESOLVE COMPLAINTS THAT ARE
WITHIN ITS JURISDICTION

This sunset factor is not applicable to the Board. Legislative mandate does not indicate that the investigation and resolution of complaints are within the jurisdiction of the Economic Planning and Development Board.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO WHICH
THE ATTORNEY GENERAL OR ANY OTHER
APPLICABLE AGENCY OF STATE
GOVERNMENT HAS THE AUTHORITY
TO PROSECUTE ACTIONS UNDER
ENABLING LEGISLATION

The enabling legislation concerning the Economic Planning and Development Board does not define any actions for prosecution by the Attorney General or any other applicable agency.

SUNSET FACTOR: THE EXTENT TO WHICH
THE BOARD HAS ADDRESSED DEFICIENCIES
IN ITS ENABLING STATUTES WHICH
PREVENT IT FROM FULFILLING ITS
STATUTORY MANDATE

The Board has not proposed or suggested any changes in its enabling statute.

CHANGES ARE NECESSARY IN THE LAWS OF
THE BOARD TO ADEQUATELY COMPLY WITH
THE FACTORS LISTED IN THIS SUBSECTION

No changes are needed in the statute regarding the Board to adequately comply with the factors of this subsection.

FINDING I

THE ARIZONA ECONOMIC PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT BOARD HAS HAD ONLY SUPERFICIAL INVOLVEMENT IN SIGNIFICANT DECISIONS AND LEGISLATION INVOLVING ECONOMIC PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT. AS OF JUNE 26, 1979, THE BOARD HAS BEEN NON-OPERATIONAL FOR TEN MONTHS AND HAS MET ONLY TWICE IN THE PAST 18 MONTHS. THEREFORE, THE BOARD PURPOSE, WHICH IS TO ACTIVELY INVOLVE CITIZENS IN POLICY-MAKING AND PROVIDE ADVICE TO THE GOVERNOR, HAS NOT BEEN FULFILLED.

The Economic Planning and Development (EPAD) Board is not fulfilling its stated intent to actively involve citizens in policy-making and to advise the Governor on matters of economic planning and development. The EPAD Board has considered an average of only four items per year in the past five years that resulted in its proposing a policy level recommendation. This represents approximately 11 percent of the items discussed at Board meetings each year. Of the 251 pieces of economic planning and development legislation introduced in the past five years, the EPAD Board has made recommendations for or against only two of them. Of the 64 pieces of legislation forwarded to the Governor for approval during the same period, the EPAD Board has not made recommendations for or against any of them. Two notable attempts to regularly include Board members in significant decision-making processes have not been implemented. Meeting frequency has declined until the Board, as of June 26, 1979, has not met for ten months and has met only twice in the past 18 months.

Legislative, Gubernatorial And

Managerial Intent Regarding

Board Operations

Publications, speeches and statements by Governors of Arizona and the Office of Economic Planning and Development (OEPAD) officials have repeatedly stated the intent for active policy-making involvement by the Economic Planning and Development Board.

The enabling legislation (ARS 41-502) contains a brief statement of EPAD Board duties:

"The Governor shall appoint an advisory economic planning and development board...."

The Governor, at the first meeting of his newly appointed Board on August 15, 1975, stated his intent regarding its operations:

"Board members, the Governor said, are to see to it every community has input into state government, as well as to the Governor. He said his door was wide open to them because they were the voices of their communities. He wanted their ideas and wanted them to join the team for economic development...."

The July/August/September 1977 issue of <u>Directions</u>, an informational publication of the Office of Economic Planning and Development, contained a description of Board duties to include:

"...assist(ing) the Governor and Executive Director (of OEPAD) in shaping relevant policies for the state. The Board provides guidance on budget, work program and projects. The Executive Director welcomes the active involvement of the Advisory Board in the policy-making process...It is the philosophy of the Executive Director that effective and realistic policies in the area of economic planning and development demand meaningful citizen input and the Advisory Board provides a statewide mechanism for this public contact." (Emphasis added)

The Executive Director of OEPAD in an October 27, 1978, statement noted:

The "objectives of the Board are to advise the Governor on matters of economic planning and development. The Board is a county 'sounding board' and allows small county representation in state government."

The apparent intent, therefore, of the EPAD Board is to actively provide policy-making advice to the Governor of Arizona and the Executive Director of the Office of Economic Planning and Development. However, our review of the EPAD Board revealed that active policy-making involvement by the Board has occurred only superficially.

Items Included At Board

Meetings And Recommended

For Implementation

The agendas for EPAD Board meetings are typically prepared by the Executive Director of OEPAD and the Chairman of the EPAD Board.

From fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79, the EPAD Board has discussed a varying number of items at each meeting. If the Board membership determines that a discussion item warrants a Board recommendation, then a resolution is passed or the recommendation is noted in the Board minutes. The OEPAD staff are responsible to assure that due consideration is provided to the Board resolutions or recommendations for implementation in OEPAD operations or for review and implementation by the Governor.

Table 1 summarizes the number of items discussed at EPAD Board meetings, the number of resolutions or recommendations recorded in Board minutes and the number of resolutions or recommendations ultimately implemented for fiscal years 1974-75 to 1978-79.

As demonstrated in Table 1, the EPAD Board has discussed 200 individual items and made 76 recommendations or resolutions* of which 29 (or 38 percent) were implemented for fiscal years 1974-75 to 1978-79. It should be noted that the EPAD Board only held one meeting, discussed eight items and made three recommendations during fiscal year 1978-79.

It should also be noted that only a small proportion of those resolutions or recommendations that have been implemented concerned policy-level matters. The vast majority of these resolutions and recommendations instead are concerned with procedural areas or endorsements of actions already taken or programs already developed as is demonstrated in Table 2.

It should be noted that 22 (or 29 percent) of the resolutions or recommendations made by the Board were related to economic planning and development policy. This represents only 11 percent of the 200 items discussed at EPAD Board meetings from fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79 (see Table 1) or an average of four such resolutions or recommendations per year. Further, due to declining activity, the Board did not make any policy-related recommendations during fiscal year 1978-79.

Finally, only one EPAD Board policy-related recommendation was implemented during the two fiscal years 1977-78 and 1978-79.

Legislation Reviewed And

Recommended By The EPAD

Board

In September 1974 and March 1976, the EPAD Board established committees on legislative matters. The purpose of these committees was to review and make recommendations on proposed state legislation. At four Board meetings from fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79, current legislation was discussed; and at five other meetings, areas of potential legislation were discussed. In two instances resolutions or recommendations were made. However, compared to the number of legislative bills introduced, passed and forwarded to the Governor for signature or veto regarding economic planning and development, this represents an insignificant level of activity.

For fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79, Arizona Legislators introduced at least 251 bills concerning economic planning and development. As shown in Table a considerable number were eventually passed by the Legislature and forwarded to the Governor for signature or veto.

Appendix III contains a listing of economic planning and development bills introduced for fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79.

As shown in Table 3, the Governor had at least 64 economic planning and development related bills to consider for signature or veto for fiscal years 1974-75 through 1978-79. The EPAD Board, however, discussed only 11 legislative bills and made recommendations on two of them during that same period. It is noteworthy that neither of the two bills upon which the Board made a recommendation were among the 64 bills that reached the Governor for signature or veto. Further, the EPAD Board has not discussed any legislative bills at any of its meetings since April 1977.

Based upon the above information, it appears that the EPAD Board has failed to fulfill its role as a source of advice to the Governor on economic planning and development legislative issues.

Two Attempts To Involve

Board Members In Decision-

Making Are Not Successful

The EPAD Board has recommended its inclusion in the decision-making processes for two separate areas: 1) selection of Four Corners Regional Commission (FCRC) projects and Economic Development Administration (EDA) 304 projects, and 2) public hearings concerning growth strategies for the State. Board members' involvement in the selection of Four Corners Regional Commission and EDA 304 projects has not been implemented and as of June 30, 1979, the growth strategy hearings have not been held.

FCRC AND EDA 304 Projects

At its April 29, 1977 meeting, EPAD Board members were briefed on the Four Corners Regional Commission (FCRC) and the fact that there was approximately \$7 million available for Arizona to spend on FCRC and economic development activities. According to the Board minutes:

"The FCRC recommended Policies and Priorities fact sheet was distributed to the Board members covering the areas of priorities and allocations, policies, industrial development, intergovernmental planning coordination, natural resources, government services, human services, and transportation. A discussion of this was held. (The Executive Director) suggested that the Board members spend some time looking this over, and that a committee from the Board be established to provide input...(The chairman) appointed a committee consisting of (four members)...." (Emphasis added)

On October 7, 1977, the EPAD Board reviewed a letter from its Chairman to the Governor concerning the FCRC and Economic Development Administration 304 grant application reviewing process. According to the Board minutes, through this process:

"...Board members representing the various counties and a representative from the county requesting the grant should have input into the decision making process...It was requested that the record indicate the Board's approval of this approach." (Emphasis added)

In a letter from the Governor dated September 30, 1977, to the Chairman of the EPAD Board, the Governor endorsed and directed this approach be implemented.

"I have long felt that the <u>OEPAD Advisory Board should</u> <u>provide the Governor's Office</u> with its review and recommendations as to where and on which funding projects the Four Corners Regional Commission and Economic Development Administration 304 grant dollars should be allocated. I, therefore, accept and recommend to...the Executive Director of the Office of Economic Planning and Development, that your suggestions be implemented as soon as possible." (Emphasis added)

According to the former Executive Director and staff of OEPAD, implementation of the EPAD Board recommendations was not feasible due to two successive changes in gubernatorial leadership.*

Growth Strategy Hearings

According to EPAD Board minutes, the Board was involved in discussions regarding public hearings for a State growth strategy and an economic development planning process on at least two occasions.

On April 29, 1977, it was announced at the Board meeting that:

"The Governor has agreed to tour the state holding public meetings encouraging citizen input as suggested at the breakfast meeting with Board members held in February. Following these hearings OEPAD will draft a statement on Arizona Alternatives regarding economic development planning process...(It was) suggested that the OEPAD Advisory Board members act as coordinators and conduct the meetings." A motion passed unanimously approving the proposed project.

A few EPAD Board members have indirectly provided input on selected 304 projects.

At the May 13, 1978 meeting, the hearings were again discussed as members were:

"...briefed...on the upcoming growth policy meetings which (the) Governor...has approved. A discussion of the proposed hearings was held resulting in an endorsement by the Board members and a pledge to assist in the preparation for and conducting of meetings as they are held."

As of June 30, 1979, public hearings on a State growth strategy or planning process have not been held.

Meeting Frequency And

Attendance Decline

The EPAD Board has, as of June 26, 1979, not met for ten months and has met only twice in the past 18 months. Attendance by members has declined until a majority of members have not attended frequently enough to justify their membership.

Meeting frequency has declined from a high of five meetings in 1973, 1974 and 1976 fiscal years to one meeting in 1979. In addition, the numbers of members attending less than 50 percent of the meetings has averaged between 40 to 50 percent of the total membership since fiscal year 1976.

This meeting frequency and attendance level is below standards set by 23 other Arizona advisory councils and boards surveyed by the Office of the Auditor General. (For a detailed discussion of low attendance, see page 28) All Arizona advisory councils and boards surveyed set quarterly meetings as a minimum level of operation. In addition, 61 (68 percent) of the 89 economic planning and/or development boards surveyed in other states by the Office of the Auditor General meet quarterly or more frequently.

In our opinion, the EPAD Board has demonstrated only superficial effectiveness as a vehicle for significant citizen involvement in state government or as a policy advisory group to the Governor. This is evidenced by the EPAD Board's sporadic involvement, declining in recent years, in economic planning and development policy decision-making; the failure to address and advise the Governor regarding legislation under his consideration; the inability to obtain a continuing role in selection of regional projects for funding; and the decline in member attendance and meeting frequency.

The legislative intent for an advisory board on state-wide economic planning and development and the managerial objectives for significant citizen involvement in policy-making have not been met. Therefore, policy is made and implemented and legislation is signed or vetoed without the advice of appointed county and state-wide representatives.

Reasons For EPAD Board's Lack Of Significant Involvement In

Policy-Making

The EPAD Board appears to have been only superficially involved in policy making because of the lack of a defined role for the Board and declining member attendance.

The newly appointed Executive Director of OEPAD stated on June 18, 1979, that the underlying cause for low levels of EPAD Board activity was:

"No role, purpose or objectives had been established for the EPAD Board."

The decline in attendance had also been identified by OEPAD staff as a compounding cause for lack of action by the Board in recent years.

According to a statement on June 11, 1979, by the Executive Director of OEPAD, the Board's emphasis, effort and membership should be changed to improve its effectiveness:

"Citizen boards will have more impact, create more member interest and be more effective in their deliberation by concentrating on local economic development, rather than state-wide planning issues. Boards, such as the EPAD one, should be more involved in the selection of local projects to be funded. The EPAD Board should be responsive to the Legislature as well as to the Executive branch.

It would be useful in the effective administration of the Economic Planning and Development (EPAD) Board to have persons appointed who were interested in economic development in their counties."

According to a comment by Mr. R. B. Caldwell from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs, the effectiveness of advisory boards depends on two factors:

"Effectiveness of Advisory Board(s) (is) directly related to how the agency head or Governor permits them to participate and the quality of (the) individuals selected..."

Advisory Boards On Economic

Planning And Development In

Other States

A survey by the Office of the Auditor General identified that as of May 31, 1979, 42 other states had a total of 89 state-wide citizen advisory boards* addressing economic planning and development areas. Nineteen states utilized more than one state-wide board to perform the functions performed by the EPAD Board.

CONCLUSION

The Economic Planning and Development Board has had only superficial involvement in policy-making and legislation affecting the economic planning and development area. The Board has not had a defined role or purpose. As of June 26, 1979, it has not been operational for ten months and has met only twice in the past 18 months. This situation, together with low attendance by members, has prevented the Board from attaining its intended purpose.

RECOMMENDATION

Consideration should be given to the following recommendation:

- The present role, involvement, lack of coordination with other advisory groups, attendance, effectiveness and resulting activity level of the Economic Planning and Development Board do not justify its continuance beyond July 1, 1980.
- If the EPAD Board is continued, a defined role for significant policy-making involvement, improved attendance and effectiveness should be obtained by gubernatorial and OEPAD Executive Director action.

Appendix IV contains comparative charts of states utilizing citizen boards in the economic planning and development area.

FINDING II

THERE ARE AT LEAST 27 OTHER BOARDS, COUNCILS AND COMMISSIONS IN ARIZONA THAT APPEAR TO PERFORM FUNCTIONS SIMILAR TO THOSE OF THE ARIZONA ECONOMIC PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT BOARD.

According to the Arizona "Sunset" Law one of the factors to be considered when evaluating the need to continue an entity is the degree of duplication of function with other entities. As of June 30, 1979, there were at least 27 other boards, councils and commissions in Arizona that appear to perform functions similar to those of the EPAD Board and very little effort has been made by the EPAD Board to communicate or coordinate activities with these other entities. As a result, a duplication of function appears to exist between the EPAD Board and the 27 other entities.

ARS 41-2354 Arizona "Sunset" Law provides that the Legislative Committee of Reference will hold at least one public hearing regarding each agency scheduled for termination and prepare a report of recommendations for continuation or termination of the agency. One factor to be considered by the Committee is duplication or conflict of functions. ARS 41-2354(F) states, in part:

"The report by the committee of reference shall also include an identification of any other agencies having similar, conflicting or duplicate objectives, and an explanation of the manner in which the agency avoids duplication or conflict with other such agencies."

In a survey of Arizona citizen boards, councils and commissions, the Office of the Auditor General identified at least 27 groups whose functions appear to be similar at least in part to those of the EPAD Board. Table 4 lists the 27 entities identified as having been established in Arizona to perform functions similar to those of the EPAD Board.

As shown in Table 4, excluding the six entities that are provided staff support through OEPAD, eight entities had experienced some contact with the EPAD Board while 13 entities had not experienced any contact with the EPAD Board. The fact that these 13 entities had not had any contact with the EPAD Board seems somewhat incongruous in light of the fact that 1) 11 of these 13 entities had experienced contact with OEPAD and 2) OEPAD provides the staff support to the EPAD Board. Table 4 also shows that apparently all of the EPAD Board functions are addressed by some of the 27 identified entities.

It should be noted that officials in OEPAD have expressed reservations regarding the comparisons shown in Table 4. In a letter to the Office of the Auditor General dated July 25, 1979, * the Assistant to the Executive Director of OEPAD stated:

"The chart (Table 4) does not analyze the purpose, scope, or quality of the other groups' efforts and, as a result, may present a one-sided picture of the functions of the groups involved. That picture is one of extensive duplication of responsibilities and programs. However, such a determination cannot be accurately made simply by comparing the formal functions and duties of each group. The actual operations of the groups listed should be analyzed for the purpose of gaining the information mentioned above and, subsequently, a clear comparison developed."

The objection of OEPAD staff notwithstanding, in our opinion the information in Table 4, coupled with the current inactivity of the EPAD Board (page 10) demonstrates that citizen input regarding economic planning and development would not be eliminated or even significantly impaired if the EPAD Board were terminated.

CONCLUSION

As of June 30, 1979, at least 27 other boards, councils or commissions in Arizona appear to perform functions similar to those of the EPAD Board. Since little effort has been made by the EPAD Board to communicate or coordinate activities with these entities, duplication of function appears to exist.

RECOMMENDATION

If the EPAD Board is continued beyond July 1, 1980, consideration should be given to the following:

- EPAD Board institute regular communication with at least the 27 other entities that perform similar functions to coordinate their efforts and avoid duplication.

FINDING III

A MAJORITY OF THE ARIZONA ECONOMIC PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT BOARD APPOINTEES HAVE NOT ATTENDED ENOUGH MEETINGS TO JUSTIFY THEIR MEMBERSHIP.

Since August 15, 1976, 12 of 21 appointees (or 57 percent) of the Economic Planning and Development Board have been absent for three or more consecutive meetings. According to the by-laws and procedures of 23 other Arizona advisory councils and boards, three consecutive member absences constitute grounds for: 1) a declaration that the board or council membership is vacant, or 2) submission of Board member's resignation or 3) recommendation of dismissal. In addition, 40 to 50 percent of the EPAD members have attended less than half of the meetings during each of the past three fiscal years. The lack of attendance at EPAD Board meetings prevents the EPAD Board from fulfilling its stated legislative intent, which is to provide for county representation on a statewide economic planning and development board.

EPAD Board Members Do Not

Attend Meetings Regularly

Membership attendance at EPAD Board meetings has declined to the point where half of the members attend less than 50 percent of the Board meetings. Table 5 summarizes membership attendance at EPAD Board meetings for fiscal years 1973-74 through 1978-79.

As a consequence of the above demonstrated poor membership attendance at EPAD Board meetings, the Board is failing to achieve its primary function of providing representation for every Arizona county on a state-wide board.

ARS 41-502 requires that the Economic Planning and Development Board include representatives from all 14 counties and states in part:

"The governor shall appoint an advisory economic planning and development board which shall be composed of at least fourteen and no more than twenty members who shall serve without compensation. At least one member shall be a bona fide resident of each county of this state." (Emphasis added)

Further, the former Executive Director of the Office of Economic Planning and Development and gubernatorial liaison to the Board described the functions of the Board to be a state-wide "sounding board" for economic planning and development issues as well as a vehicle through which the counties have a voice in state government.

However, EPAD Board member attendance at Board meetings has deteriorated such that 29 to 50 percent of Arizona's counties have been represented at less than half of the EPAD Board meetings in each fiscal year since 1975-76. Table 6 summarizes county representation at EPAD Board meetings for fiscal years 1973-74 through 1978-79.

It should be noted that Gila County has not had a representative attend an EPAD Board meeting since August 15, 1975.

^{*} Maricopa and Pima Counties have consistently had two to three representatives on the EPAD Board since fiscal year 1973-74; Apache County had two representives since June 1976 whereas the other 11 Arizona counties have had only one representative.

Causes For Excessive Absenteeism

The causes for excessive absenteeism by EPAD Board members are numerous. However, a primary cause is the absence of EPAD Board by-laws, particularly those relating to membership and attendance at meetings.

A review of Arizona statutes revealed that EPAD Board members do not have a legally established length of appointment on the Board. Instead, Board members serve until they are replaced by the Governor or resign. In addition, the EPAD Board has not established any by-laws concerning meeting attendance requirements for Board members. By failing to establish such by-laws, the EPAD Board is deficient when contrasted with other Arizona advisory councils. A survey of 23 Arizona advisory councils conducted by the Office of the Auditor General revealed that all had established by-laws or procedures regarding terms of membership and had established standards for attendance to the effect that three consecutive meeting absences were unacceptable.

In the event of three consecutive meeting absences either: 1) a membership vacancy was declared, 2) the absent member was recommended for dismissal, or 3) the absent member was required to submit a resignation.

Had the EPAD Board adopted by-laws regarding member attendance at meetings similar to those of the other Arizona advisory and councils boards surveyed, then a majority of the EPAD Board members appointed since August 15, 1975**, would not be on the Board. During the period from fiscal year 1975-76 through 1978-79, 12 of the 21 members who have been appointed to the EPAD Board have missed at least three consecutive meetings.

Governor Castro appointed an entirely new Board membership that met for the first time on August 15, 1975.

It should be noted that a review of EPAD Board minutes revealed that unresponsive support from OEPAD staff may have contributed to the absence of EPAD Board by-laws. According to EPAD Board minutes, the Board discussed adopting by-laws on five occasions during its meetings for fiscal years 1976-77 and 1977-78. The EPAD Board on five separate occasions from February 1977 to May 1978 requested the OEPAD staff assigned to the Board to either provide the Board with samples of by-laws used by other State advisory boards or draft sample by-laws for the Board. The OEPAD staff performed neither of the requested functions for the Board.*

In addition to the absence of EPAD Board by-laws, other identified causes for poor member attendance at EPAD Board meetings include the following:

From the staff of OEPAD:

- Absence of gubernatorial action to replace non-attending members, and
- Conflicts with members' business or personal commitments.

From members of the EPAD Board:

- Conflicts with members' business or personal commitments,
- Lack of interest or commitment by members, and
- Illness

Finally, a Board member, in a letter dated January 20, 1978 to the then Governor of Arizona, stated another reason for not attending EPAD Board meetings:

"Initially...I was enthused about my work on this Board and attended all functions. However...it became apparent to me that (the) Governor...was simply not utilizing the services of the Board in a manner which would be beneficial to the state nor worthwhile to the individual members in terms of the time commitment required."

In approximately June 1978, the OEPAD staff provided the EPAD Board members with a copy of by-laws used by local organizations.

CONCLUSION

Attendance by a majority of the Economic Planning and Development Board appointees has been substandard since 1975. This substandard attendance has nullified the stated legislative intent for the Board to consist of representatives from each county of the state.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that, if the Board is continued beyond July 1, 1980, consideration be given to the following:

- Board members be appointed with the interest and ability to attend meetings.
- 2. Activities of the Board be of such magnitude to justify member attendance.
- 3. EPAD Board members adopt by-laws approved by the Governor for their operations. These by-laws should include procedures regarding excessive member absenteeism and terms of appointment.

FINDING IV

SINCE 1976 EFFORTS TO OBTAIN PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN ARIZONA ECONOMIC PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT BOARD MEETINGS HAVE DECLINED TO AN INADEQUATE LEVEL AS HAVE ATTEMPTS TO NOTIFY THE PUBLIC OF BOARD MEETING DATES AND ACTIONS.

EPAD Board efforts to obtain public participation in its meetings and to notify public of meeting dates and Board actions have steadily declined since 1976. In the early 1970's, the Board meetings, memberships and actions were announced in regular press releases to news media throughout the state and in <u>Directions</u>, a widely distributed publication of the Office of Economic Planning and Development. In addition, Board meeting locations were rotated throughout the state to obtain local input. However, beginning in fiscal year 1976-77, the number of EPAD Board press releases was reduced and eventually stopped; the number of articles regarding the Board that were published in <u>Directions</u> declined, and <u>Directions</u> ceased publication in June, 1979; and the number of Board meetings held in rural areas decreased. As a result, current EPAD Board efforts to obtain public participation and to notify the public of its actions are inadequate.

A Decline In Efforts

To Publicize EPAD Board

Meetings and Actions and

Encourage Public Participation

Prior to 1976, the EPAD Board notified the public of Board meetings and actions and encouraged public participation in four ways: 1) press releases, 2) articles in <u>Directions</u>, the Office of Economic Planning and Development newsletter, 3) rotating EPAD Board meeting locations throughout the State, and 4) posting of public notices in the Capitol area. Currently, the EPAD Board utilizes the posting of public notices in the Capitol area, as required by law, as its only means of formal communication, and the percentage of EPAD Board meetings held outside of the metropolitan Phoenix and Tucson areas has declined sharply since fiscal year 1974-75.

Press Releases

The issuance of press releases before and after EPAD Board meetings and to announce Board member appointments and officers was a regular practice until 1976. These releases typically were sent to all Arizona daily papers, radio and television stations as well as weekly papers in the home towns of Board members.

According to OEPAD staff, in 1976 draft press releases on EPAD Board activities were sent to the Governor's office for consideration, approval and release rather than direct release by OEPAD. However, beginning in 1976, the Governor's office ceased issuing the press releases. After several months, when these draft releases were not utilized, OEPAD staff responsible for public information were directed to cease preparation of the press releases. Subsequently, the OEPAD public information staff were not even informed when an EPAD Board meeting was to be held. According to OEPAD staff, in the past 18 to 24 months, no news article has been approved and released by the Governor's office regarding Board activities.

Articles Published

In Directions

Articles concerning the activities of the EPAD Board used to frequently appear in the OEPAD publication, <u>Directions</u>. This publication was distributed to all state agency officials with economic planning and development responsibilitie state legislators, city and county government officials, business community leaders, planning agencies in other states and individuals upon request. The mailing list for <u>Directions</u> increased from approximately 600 in 1971 to over 3,000 in 1979. <u>Directions</u> was published monthly from 1971 to 1976, bimonthly in 1976 and quarterly from 1977 to June 1979 when it ceased publication. In fiscal year 1975-76, eight articles on EPAD Board activities appeared in <u>Directions</u>; however, the number of such articles has steadily declined since then as shown in Table 7.

An additional issue was published in 1978.

It should be noted that no articles concerning the EPAD Board have appeared in <u>Directions</u> since the 1977-78 fiscal year.

Posting Of Notices

ARS 38-431.02 requires that public notices of EPAD Board meetings be posted in locations specified in a statement filed with the Secretary of State and states in part:

"The public bodies of the state shall file a statement with the secretary of state stating where all public notices of their meetings will be posted."

The EPAD Board has consistantly been in compliance with ARS 38-431.02 regarding the posting of public notices of their meetings.

Rotation Of EPAD

Board Meeting

Location Declines

According to the former Executive Director of OEPAD in a statement on October 27, 1978, EPAD Board meeting locations are determined by the Board and the purpose for rotating EPAD Board meetings was:

"Location of EPAD Board meetings was rotated to obtain local input on Board matters."

Prior to fiscal year 1975-76 EPAD Board meetings were rotated to different geographic locations throughout the state. Since fiscal year 1975-76 a majority of EPAD Board meetings have been held in the Phoenix or Tucson areas. For example, during fiscal years 1972-73 through 1974-75, 62 percent of EPAD Board meetings were held outside of Phoenix and Tucson. However, during fiscal years 1975-76 through 1978-79 only 36 percent of EPAD Board meetings were held outside of Phoenix and Tucson. Further, during fiscal years 1977-78 and 1978-79, 60 percent of EPAD Board meetings have been held in the Phoenix metropolitan area.

Methods For Obtaining

Public Input

According to a publication, <u>Techniques of Public Involvement</u> from the Council of State Planning Agencies, an affiliate of the National Governors' Association, there are generally six objectives for a public involvement program.

- "1. Identify the public concerned or affected by the policies to be formed.
- 2. Provide information to the public.
- Receive and document public comments, concerns, and opinions.
- 4. Document, evaluate and use public input where possible.
- 5. Report results to the public.
- 6. Provide program budget and staffing."

In a framework for evaluation of such public participation, the Council of State Planning Agencies suggested methods that should be used to reach these objectives:

- Develop and use distribution, mailing or contact lists of interested and/or affected groups, organizations, and officials.
- 2. Talk with local citizen leaders and officials.
- 3. Map and analyze target groups needing to be involved.
- 4. Provide information to the public through television, radio, direct mail, newspapers and presentations at community workshops, briefings and meetings.
- Prepare documentation for use of public input through written reports or audio/visual documentation of public meetings, surveys, workshops and questionnaires.
- Hold forums to obtain input, such as public meetings, workshops, citizen committees, task forces or commissions.
- Conduct surveys or polls to obtain input.
- 8. Report results of citizen participation to public through media or direct mailings.
- Develop a plan for citizen participation including objectives, methods, budget and staff.

The Economic Planning and Development Board had, until 1976, utilized five of the nine methods to encourage public participation by:

- Distribution of <u>Directions</u> with Board related information to interested parties.
- 2. Discussions with local officials at, before and after meetings rotated to communities in the state.
- 3. Distribution of information to the media through press releases.
- 4. Meeting, on a rotated basis, throughout the state.
- 5. Reporting results of meetings in <u>Directions</u>.

Since 1976, such efforts to obtain public participation have declined to mere compliance with the posting of notices for public meetings. As stated by Mr. Ernest Gellhorn, former Dean of the Arizona College of Law, regarding notice to the public for their participation in administrative proceedings:

"That existing procedures conform to constitutional minima is not a reason for agencies to fail to explore appropriate procedures for providing effective notice to the affected public and their representatives."

CONCLUSION

Efforts to obtain public participation in EPAD Board meetings has been declining since 1976. Past practices of news releases, publication of a newsletter, and rotation of meeting locations have all declined or ceased. Compared to standards for public participation in planning literature, this decline of effort has reached an inadequate level.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended if the Economic Planning and Development Board is continued beyond July 1, 1980, that consideration be given to the following:

- The Board and OEPAD should adopt such methods for publicly announcing Board meetings and actions so citizens have an opportunity to express their concerns regarding economic planning and development issues.

OTHER PERTINENT INFORMATION

EPAD BOARD MEMBER RESIDENCY AND OCCUPATIONS FOR FISCAL YEARS 1972-73 THROUGH 1978-79.

ARS 41-502 requires that each of the 14 counties be represented on the EPAD Board by at least one member. Table 8 contains a listing of the counties, number of appointments for fiscal years 1972-73 through 1978-79 and the appointees' occupations.

Dear Mr. Norton:

Thank you for the opportunity to review the draft OEPAD Board Sunset Audit. Several Board members have commented to me, and I would like to share their concerns with you. I would also add that although you listed a September 10th deadline for comments, the Board will not be meeting until September 18th, and this will be a discussion item. If you could allow us this leeway, we will give you an answer in more detail right after the Board meeting.*

Several Board members have expressed concern over two aspects of this report.

- 1. The past activities and lack of action by the Board are there for the record. However, I believe your report should also comment on the activities concerning the new Board. I am attaching a copy of the minutes of our first meeting which shows how this Board has vowed to be a strong policy Board and is adopting attendance criteria so that members that do not attend will be dropped from the Board. Governor Babbitt has formally concurred with this policy. In addition, I have attached a prioritized list of activities the Board members identified at the meeting on August 14, 1979.
- 2. It is stated, despite objections from the OEPAD staff, that there are twenty-seven other boards and commissions doing economic development. It is my considered opinion, as well as many other members of the Board, that the OEPAD Board is crucial because it is the only statewide board that focuses on overall economic development policies. Most of the other boards and groups you review are minor in the economic development and planning field and have limited impact. I strongly urge your staff to do a

more qualitative review of these other boards' actual workings and activities, and I believe you will see the necessity for a function as designed in the statutes for the OEPAD Board.

The new Board of Directors has also agreed to an aggressive meeting policy and would invite your staff to sit in our September 18th, October 10th, or any other subsequent Board meetings. I would ask that your staff make mention of the policies and practices of the new Board and that be a part of your report. Also, I would invite another review of the OEPAD Board prior to July 1, 1980 to critique current activities and to ensure the Board is on a productive course.

After the new Board has had an opportunity to comment as a body on your draft report, we will send you further information.

Thank you very much, and we look forward to working with you in the future.



Bob Hathaway, Director of Development and Terry Murray, Director of Planning were both out of town.

Larry Landry acknowledged OEPAD's role as a service agency with the ultimate responsibility of facilitating investment and leveraging private activity with state and federal resources. He sought the Board's specific concerns with the performance, emphasis and direction of OEPAD staff.

Specific comments and recommendations by Donovan Kramer included using "non-metropolitan" rather than "rural" and developing a periodic staff report to Board members.

Chairman Archibald suggested that Board members stay informed so as to be able to communicate the role of OEPAD to constituents and further recommended local discussions to identify and prioritize needs.

Jim Nelson briefly outlined the Planning Division's capabilities and the different programs involved:

Federal/Congressional Liaison Intergovernmental Programs State and Community Planning Research Energy and Environmental Policy

Rich Wetzel and John Morales briefly outlined the Development Division's capabilities and the different programs involved:

Economic Development
International Trade
Motion Picture Development
Manpower Planning and Coordination
Energy Programs

Larry Landry pointed out that cooperation and integration was being stressed within the office so as to provide a higher level of service to the state's communities.

At Chairman Archibald's suggestion, the Board broke into small discussion groups to identify and prioritize issues for future discussion. Those issues are summarized on the attached sheets.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

OEPAD Board Discussion Items

The OEPAD staff has generally categorized and prioritized the seventeen items discussed by the Board at the August 14th meeting. The categories selected are: Planning, Development and Procedural. Some items may fall into one or more categories, i.e., Planning and Development.

A brief description of current OEPAD work follows each issue, when appropriate. The items are prioritized within each category.

Planning/Development

- 1. Existing and Recommended Processes for State Economic Development.
- 2. State Policy on Non-Metropolitan Location of Economic Activity (Consider Incentives).
 OEPAD has been working on the development of a State Investment Strategy and the work of the Rural Development Advisory Group.
- 3. <u>Develop Border Industries with Mexico.</u>

 OEPAD has developed a Southwest Border Investment Strategy for those Arizona Counties within the Southwest Border Regional Commission area (Yuma, Pima, Santa Cruz and Cochise Counties).
- 4. Coordinate Community and Reservation Interests.

 The Economic Development staff has worked with the Hopi Tribe in putting together a marketing and information packet. In addition OEPAD has provided, through the Planning Division, a variety of planning assistance to some of the smaller tribes.

Planning

- 1. Border County Concept (Multi-County Regions).

 This activity coincides with OEPAD's efforts on the State
 Investment Strategy and the identification of potential growth areas.

 A different strategy may need to be developed for certain areas based upon the factors of growth, i.e., mining, tourism, etc.
- 2. Extend Contact with Local Planning Boards, Especially County.

 OEPAD planning staff will continue to meet with the county planning directors at least on a quarterly basis. In addition, the planning staff works closely with the League of Cities and Towns and the Association of Counties.

 Planning assistance is provided to communities by OEPAD staff, upon request from the local mayor or board of supervisors.

3. Policy Position on Various Functional Areas.

Development

- 1. Develop Community Professionalism via Leadership and Education.
 The Economic Development section is currently developing an informational packet for communities in the area of industrial site surveys. This information will provide the basis for seminars in Flagstaff, Williams, Winslow and Holbrook, in response to local interest.
- 2. Develop Community Advertising Criteria.

Procedural

1. Educate each Community on OEPAD Services.

The Government Information Service, which assists communities in identifying potential federal programs is located within the Clearinghouse. A letter describing the service was sent out to the communities and identified key staff members for various

types of projects. A copy of this letter will be forwarded to the Board members.

A brochure is being developed which will describe the activities of OEPAD and the various sections within the office.

- 2. Personal Visits by Staff.
- 3. Inform Board.
 Feedback to Board.
 Active rather than symbolic role of Board.
- 4. <u>Liaison Opportunities with Federal Agencies</u>.

 The GIS service, 304 activities, the Rural Development Advisory Council as well as other activities provide an OEPAD liaison role between federal agencies and communities.
- 5. Accountability of Staffs Past.

APPENDIX I

ENABLING STATUTE FOR EPAD BOARD

§ 41-502. Governor's advisory economic planning and development board; executive director

- A. The governor shall appoint an advisory economic planning and development board which shall be composed of at least fourteen and no more than twenty members who shall serve without compensation. At least one member shall be a bona fide resident of each county of this state.
- B. The executive director of the office of economic planning and development shall be appointed by the governor and serve at the pleasure of the governor.

Added Laws 1968, Ch. 207, § 3. As amended Laws 1970, Ch. 204, § 151; Laws 1972, Ch. 192, § 13.

Historical Note

This section was amended by Laws 1972, Ch. 163, § 43, and Laws 1972, Ch. 192, § 13, and neither amendment referred to the other.

Laws 1973, Ch. 157, § 55, effective August 8, 1973, repealed this section as amended by Laws 1972, Ch. 163, § 43.

A.R.S. former § 41–502, which enumerated the purposes of the Arizona development board, was derived from Laws 1954, Ch. 113, § 3, and Code 1939, Supp. 1954, § 4–803, and was repealed by Laws 1968, Ch. 207, § 2.

Notes of Decisions

I. Validity of prior law

Appropriation to state development board did not constitute a violation of Const. Art. 4, pt. 2, § 19, prohibiting local or special laws or a gift or loan of credit prohibited by Const. Art. 9, § 7, even though funds so appropriated would go to a specific individual, corpo-

ration, or association without competitive bidding on the goods or services purchased, and though face of appropriation indicated a specific odd amount including both dollars and cents, where appropriation would be for a public purpose within meaning of board's powers and duties. Op.Atty.Gen.No.62–15.

Termination

The economic planning and development board shall terminate on July 1, 1980, unless continued. See §§ 41-2361 and 41-2372.

Dear Ms. Good:

Thank you for sending me a copy of the chart comparing the functions of selected Arizona commissions, boards and councils with those of the Economic Planning and Development Board. I have reviewed the chart and would like to share my thoughts about it with you.

The chart does not analyze the purpose, scope, or quality of the other groups' efforts and, as a result, may present a one-sided picture of the functions of the groups involved. That picture is one of extensive duplication of responsibilities and programs. However, such a determination cannot be accurately made simply by comparing the formal functions and duties of each group. The actual operations of the groups listed should be analyzed for the purpose of gaining the information mentioned above and, subsequently, a clear comparison developed.

As an example of the confusion that the chart creates, I point to the comparison of the OEPAD board functions with those of the State Community Development Council. Listed among the duplicative functions of the two groups are industrial development, tourist promotion, employment and job availability data development, international trade development, and motion picture development. The statutory responsibilities granted the State Community Development Council, are set forth in ARS § 11–711.20, and do not correspond with those identified in the chart.*

As I understand the data gathering process involved in the chart's development, individuals from the particular groups were asked to provide you with information. While this is a completely acceptable procedure it seems that your office should attempt to further check the information provided to ensure that the items listed are in compliance with the group's charge.**** seems somewhat unfair to subject the OEPAD Board to extensive review and then compare its functions with other
