



Proposition 301 expenditures were 3.49 percent of the District's \$2,526,443 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

#### District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher earned an additional \$2,691 in salary, plus an additional \$680 in performance pay distributed in fiscal year 2003. On average, each counselor and librarian earned an additional \$2,909.
- 26 teachers accomplished goals involving improved student achievement, dropout rates, and attendance.
- 66 students participated in tutoring and electronic learning programs. High-school programs enabled 29 students to earn credit in previously failed courses.
- 11 teachers and 115 students participated in a mentoring program to decrease the dropout rate. The dropout rate in 2002 was 10.4 percent compared to a previous 4-year average of 27.3 percent.
- All K-5 teachers partcipated in weekly staff trainings.
