



# Proposition 301

# District-reported 2004 results

### Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher earned an additional \$1,823 in salary, each counselor earned an additional \$1,500, and each instructional aide earned an additional \$1,000. Also, 11 support staff including clerical, custodial, transportation, and food service workers were each paid \$500 from performance pay based on the results of a parent survey rating all aspects of the school. These amounts exclude a portion of performance pay not distributed until fiscal year 2005.

#### Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on district-wide performance.
- 62 percent of students, on average, scored at or above the national average on a standardized test.
- More than 75 percent of parents surveyed rated the school as satisfactory or better.
- A program was established to provide additional monies for student assistance programs.

#### Menu

 Monies were used to hire a kindergarten teacher to maintain small class sizes. According to the District, reducing the class sizes enabled it to provide a high level of individual attention to students.
