



Proposition 301 expenditures were 3.90 percent of the District's \$35,019,428 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

#### District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher earned an additional \$1,091 in performance pay. Additional monies were distributed in fiscal year 2003.
- AIMS intervention activities included accelerated reading and reading intervention, after-school math remediation, a study hall and tutoring, and a workshop for parents.
- Dropout prevention activities included an alternative physical education program, Saturday school, afterschool tutoring, and a homework hotline.
- Teachers' assistants remained in classrooms for additional hours to reduce the student/adult ratios.
- Monies also paid for teacher development activities, including training on goal setting, reading intervention and CPR. In addition, approximately 61 teachers attended conferences and workshops in reading, math, and other subjects.
